#### ABOUT THE WORK

With eclectic, multilingual, Latinx aesthetics, Los Angeles and Riverside-based Primera Generación Dance Collective exposes "el desmadre" (the messiness) that is their first-generation Mexican American experience. Rooted in popular Latiné music, movement, and moments, their newest evening-length multimedia dance work, *NOStalgia POP*, pays homage and cheeky critique to the recuerdos romanticos that link Latine bodies together. A collage of '80s pop en Español, the "Latin Explosion" of the '90s, and millennial Mexican core weave together with media depictions of gente Latina. Four captivating dancers tell the story of how messy, fruitful, joyful, and painful the development of an ever-growing Latin Pop culture memory has been and the ways in which mainstream media shapes and is (re)shaped by Latine nostalgia.

Presented in English and Spanish without surtitles. The program includes a post-performance talk on June 28, moderated by Dr. Jose Luis Reynoso (Bello).

#### ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Primera Generación Dance Collective is a collaborative group based in Los Angeles and Riverside, California formed by Alfonso Abraham Cervera, Rosa Rodríguez-Frazier, Irvin Manuel Gonzalez, and Patricia "Patty" Huerta. PGDC focuses on the visibilization of Mexican American corporeality, joy, and loss through movement-based exploration, process, and performance. The collective grounds their works in rasquache play and resourcefulness, generating work that speaks to their brown, working-class experiences. Utilizing a hybridization of text, satire, song, and movement, the collective fuses together their eclectic aesthetics to expose el "desmadre" (messiness) that is embedded in being first-generation Mexican Americans, reclaiming iconography and "low-brow" art to spark brown futurity. PGDC has performed at CalArts REDCAT, UCR ARTS Riverside, The Odyssey Theatre Los Angeles, HomeLA, Highways Performance Space, Human Resources L.A, FLACC Festival, Dance Mission Theater, Riverside Trolley Dances, and BlakTinx Dance Festival in Arizona and L.A. PGDC is a 2021 recipient of the National Endowment of the Arts Grant and continuous grantees of the California Arts Council and the Department of Cultural Affairs. Alfonso Abraham Cervera (he/him/they/them/él/elle) is an Assistant Professor in Dance at The Ohio State University and a first-generation Queer Mexican American performer, educator, curator, and activist. His work bridges Queerness, Ballet Folklorico, and Afro-Latine social dances through a contemporary autobiographical experience called Poc-Chuc. This inclusive technique has been praised for connecting "the sociality of the audience with the isolated frigidity of the concert stage...resulting in a world of untethered Mexican modernity." Cervera has taught at numerous institutions and showcased both solo and collaborative works at prominent venues and festivals. He is also a certified Yoga teacher, Reiki healer, board member of Show Box LA, and a founding member of Primera Generación Dance Collective (PGDC). Cervera recently received the Greater Columbus Arts Council Award for his new collaborative work Café con Pan, set to premiere in May 2025.

Rosa Rodríguez-Frazier (she/her) is an educator, dance-maker, and performing artist based in Riverside, California. As a first-generation Mexican American woman artist, she values "movement" as a means to wrestle with and rejoice in her *Mexicanidad*. Her movement aesthetic and choreographic interests are rooted in a mix of soulful Contemporary and Latin social dance forms approached by "experimental" dance-making processes and Post-Modern frameworks. Over the past twenty years Frazier has had the opportunity to create and perform work throughout the U.S. and Mexico. Frazier holds a BA in Dance and an MFA in Experimental Choreography from the University of California, Riverside and is an Associate Professor of Dance at Riverside City College. Together with members of Primera Generación Dance Collective, Frazier is a board member of non-profit organization Show Box L.A.

**Dr. Irvin Manuel Gonzalez** (he/él/they/elle) is an artivist, scholar, community organizer, and teacher. He currently works at the Ohio State University as an assistant professor in Dance and is a founding member of Primera Generación Dance Collective. Gonzalez's scholarship analyzes how immigrant, queer, and working-class Latin American social dancers navigate hegemonic forces through feeling and creativity while situating creative constructions of/for belonging and social change. As an artist, Gonzalez grounds his work in rasquachismo, a working-class Chicanx sensibility, to generate collaborations and new potentials that upend the intended use-value of materials, connections, and being. He is a founding member of Primera Generación Dance Collective (PGDC), a board member of Show Box Los Angeles (SBLA), and will be joining the board of directors for the Dance Studies Association Fall 2024.

Patricia "Patty" Huerta (she/her) is a first-generation Mexican American dance artist, dance-maker, curator, community organizer, arts advocate, and educator from East L.A., who is dedicated to amplifying the stories of her Latiné/x culture by weaving together her Afro-Latin Social Dance background with her contemporary dance practices. She received her B.A. and M.F.A. in Dance and Experimental Choreography from the University of California Riverside (UCR) and has presented work at various venues including The Odyssey Theatre, CalArts REDCAT, The Ford, México City, etc. Patty is a founding member of Primera Generación Dance Collective (PGDC), a board member and curator for Show Box L.A.
